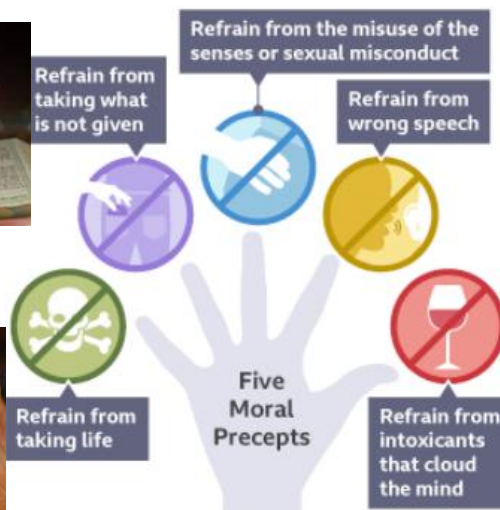
- Analyse the scriptures of key religious texts and apply them to their own lives.

Key Vocabulary

Holy scriptures	Written word of God
Ten commandments	God's rules for living a good life, reminding us to love and respects God and others.
Guru Granth Sahib	The holy book giving Sikhs guidance and teachings about how to live their lives.
Bhagavad Gita	Sacred text in Hinduism that teaches about duty, action, and the nature of reality.
Moral codes	A set of rules that are widely accepted by a group of people to show them what is right and wrong.
Buddhist Precepts	The five precepts are equivalent to a code of conduct or set of rules to follow if you're to live a truly Buddhist life.
wisdom	The knowledge and good sense we gain with experience which allows us to follow good values and make good choices.
Incarnation	God taking on a human body and becoming a man, Jesus Christ.

THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

- I. Thou shalt have no other gods before me.
- II. Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image.
- III. Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain.
- IV. Remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy.
- V. Honour thy father and thy mother.
- VI. Thou shalt not kill.
- VII. Thou shalt not commit adultery.
- VIII. Thou shalt not steal.
- IX. Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbour.
- X. Thou shalt not covet.
